PROGRAMME NOTE:

The text for *Dead Horses* is taken from a poem I wrote at school, aged sixteen, after our class was encouraged to submit "something small, perhaps a cinquain" to be considered for the annual Poetry Evening. Instead, I chose to attempt a poem using every "word of the week" my school had ever had. It is important to note, when interpreting the tone of the text, that my doing so was not because I was a prolific poet, nor was I fishing for report card glory...rather as one of the world's most productive procrastinators, who would have done almost anything to avoid maths homework; there were over one hundred words, and it was *very* time consuming. After achieving my technical goal, I felt able to slice a couple stanzas off, for quality's sake. When writing this piece in 2021, no longer sixteen, I felt the need to again abridge the poem, also for quality's sake.

The poem itself is about words, and how wonderful, and terrible, and loud, and dangerous, and powerful, and silly they are.

PERFORMANCE NOTE:

- Deliver as if in a theatre, quasi cabaret.
- Pitching is important within internal sections where sequences are involved, but as full
 priority should always be placed on the performance, I am happy for the general
 impression of intervallic relationships to be given if need be.
- Provide the glossary alongside the text for performances.
- It will probably always be at least eight minutes in length

Spewing fustians, like stentorian drintlings These panjandrums trammel the Thoughts of thousands: Your brain is a palimpsest, a Filipendulous ventifact. Coruscations Consumed by the ultracrepidarians, Surrendered to cynosures Incapable of impugning.

Quidnuncs prostitute words with the same Assiduity, listen, the roucoulement Of the mupmsimuses at Ouotidian nuncheons, bathed in a Miasma of coffee and spite. A funambulist in zugzwang Balancing on blandishments Baltering is banned, lest you Fall to the kenspeckle, veprecose Hadal of narcissistic shame.

I hope that I'm not being abstruse? Let me elucidate -Words leave a frittle on the soul Only inflated by the inexorable Arrival of more words, like In torridity, the inchoate yet Fervid psithurisms and psittacisms will Only be hushed when Mundified till impluvious.

Prestidigitator - Magician

Encomium – A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly

Siffilate - To whisper or hiss softly

Dulcifluous – Flowing in a dulcet or gentle manner

Gongoozlers – An idle spectator, specifically a person who enjoys watching activity on the canals of the United Kingdom

Lassitude – A state of physical or mental weariness; lack of energy

Snurping – To contract into a shrivelled form

Sesquipedalian – Polysyllabic

Xyresic – Razor sharp

Immarcescible - Indestructable

Abluvion – That which is washed off [obsolete]

Saccade – A rapid movement of the eye between fixation points

Anpeyn – To try ones hardest [archaic]

Fardel - A bundle

Flim-flam – Nonsensical or insincere talk

Yepsen – Amount that can be held in two hands cupped together [obsolete]

Concatenations – A series of interconnected things

Elucubrations – To work out or express by studious effort

Polysyndetons – Repetition of conjunctions in close succession

Pandiculate – To stretch and stiffen as when fatigued and drowsy, or after waking from sleep

Fustians – Pompous or pretentious speech or writing

Stentorian - (of a person's voice) Loud and powerful

Drintling – The clucking sound that turkeys make

Panjandrum – A person who has or claims to have a great deal of authority or influence

Trammel – To deprive of freedom of action

Palimpsest – Something reused or altered but still bearing visible traces of its earlier form

Filipendulous – Suspended by or strung upon a thread

Ventifact - A stone shaped by the erosive action of wind-blown sand

Coruscation – A display of brilliance or wit

Ultracrepidarians - A person who offers opinions beyond their own knowledge

Cynosures – A person or thing that is the centre of attention or admiration

Impugning – To cause people to doubt someone's character, qualities, or reputation by criticizing them

Quidnuncs - An inquisitive and gossipy person

Assiduity - Constant or close attention to what one is doing

Roucoulement – A soft cooing or murmuring noise, specifically the sound made by a pigeon

Mumpsimus – A person who obstinately adheres to old customs or ideas in spite of evidence that they are wrong or unreasonable

Quotidian – Of or occurring every day; daily. Ordinary or everyday; mundane

Nuncheons - A light refreshment between meals; a snack [archaic]

Miasma – An oppressive or unpleasant atmosphere which surrounds or emanates from something. An unpleasant or unhealthy smell.

Funambulist – A tightrope walker

Zugzwang - A situation in which the obligation to make a move in one's turn is a serious, often decisive, disadvantage.

Blandishments – A flattering or pleasing statement or action used as a means of gently persuading someone to do something.

Baltering – To dance or tread clumsily [archaic]

Kenspeckle – Easily recognizable; conspicuous.

Veprecose – Full of prickly shrubs or bushes; full of brambles [obsolete]

Hadal – Relating to the zone of the sea greater than 6000 m in depth (chiefly oceanic trenches).

Abstruse - Difficult to understand; obscure.

Elucidate – Make (something) clear; explain

Frittle – A temporary mark on the skin caused by the impression of a textured surface [obsolete]

Inexorable – Impossible to stop or prevent. **Torrid** – Very hot and dry. Full of difficulty.

Inchoate - Just begun and so not fully formed or developed

Psithurisms – The sound of rustling leaves [obsolete]

Psittacisms - Parrot-like repetition.

Mundified - Cleansed or purified

Impluvious – Wet with rain [obsolete]

Mortuusequusphobia – Fear of tomato ketchup. Coming from the rhyming slang of "dead horse" meaning "red sauce".
